1.0 <u>Background</u>

- 1.1 As part of their work programme, Hertfordshire County Council Overview and Scrutiny Committee identified the issue of 'role and effectiveness of PSCOs' as one they wanted to review via a topic (task and finish) group.
- 1.2 The issue was identified as one which affected all Districts and Boroughs and the topic group was set up as a 'joint scrutiny' in

order to hear evidence from interested councils. East Herts registered its interest in being involved.

2.0 Report

2.1 The draft scrutiny remit received from HCC shows the topic group is planning to review the evidence against three HCC priorities – which are different to the priorities/straplines used by East Herts. Members need to mindful of this when illustrating their evidence with specific examples. The priorities are highlighted below.

HCC Priorities for Action:- how this item helps deliver the Priorities
