What action is East Herts Council planning to take in order to reduce the terrible level of air pollution at Hockerill cross roads in Bishop's Stortford?

MEMBERS' QUESTIONS

Question 1

Councillor R Henson to ask the Executive Member for Economic Development:

Many of my residents in Sele have expressed concern about the impact on local street parking, following the closure of the Bridge House car park. This will affect residents in other parts of Hertford too. Would the Executive Member set out the measures being considered to help ensure that the impact on residents is as small as possible, and does he agree with me that Network Rail should play its part and work with the Council to find solutions to this challenge?

Question 2

Councillor P Ruffles to ask the Chairman of the Environment Scrutiny Committee:

I would be grateful if Councillor John Wyllie, as Chairman of Environment Scrutiny and of the relevant Task and Finish Group, would provide information about his Task and Finish Group looking into sustainable transport and give an update about progress so far? We live in a District with very high figures for car ownership and I wonder what alternatives are being considered? How can members of the public become involved to share their knowledge and expertise?

Question 3

Councillor B Deering to ask the Executive Member for Economic Development:

There is acute pressure in relation to commuter parking at both Hertford North and Hertford East stations. Residential parking zones can have the unintended consequence of relocating parking pressures to other areas to the detriment of those local residents, or even reducing the total available car parking capacity, which can give rise to traffic management and safety issues. For example, commuters from Hertford East point out that many spaces reserved for residents in the nearby RPZ are empty during the day but still unavailable for others to use. This forces commuter parking into other streets and areas of the town. Elsewhere, there are schemes which permit limited stranger parking in residential streets in RPZs. Will the Executive Member responsible for parking please liaise with the Officers concerned to bring forward proposals that would enable more parking for commuters thereby better safeguarding residents' parking requirements?

465 BRAUGHING CONSERVATION AREA APPRAISAL AND MANAGEMENT PLAN

The Executive Member for Development Management and Council Support submitted a report on the Braughing Conservation Area Appraisal following public consultation. She detailed the outcome of the public consultation in the report now submitted.

The Appraisal identified the special character of the Conservation Area together with the elements that should

be retained or enhanced and those which detracted from the identified character. Once adopted by the Council, the Appraisal would become a 'material consideration' in the process of determining planning applications. It would also link into the development of neighbourhood planning.

The Executive Member advised that the local ward Member had endorsed the report and the Parish Council's questions had been addressed.

The Executive supported the proposals as now detailed.

<u>RECOMMENDED</u> – that (A) the responses to the public consultation be noted and the Officer responses and proposed changes to the Braughing Conservation Area Character Appraisal and Management Proposals be supported;

 (B) authority be delegated to the Head of Planning and Building Control, in consultation with the Executive Member for Development Management and Council Support, to make any further minor and consequential changes to the document which may be necessary; and

(C) the Braughing Conservation Area Character Appraisal and Management Proposals be adopted.

466 **EXTERNAL AUDITOR APPOINTMENT**

The Executive Member for Finance and Support Services submitted a report setting out the options available for appointing external auditors from 2018/19 and the process for achieving a successful procurement of external audit services. The Local Audit & Accountability Act 2014 had abolished the Audit Commission, and required local authorities to appoint their own external auditors for the audit of the 2017/18 accounts by 31 December 2018. The Executive Member outlined the four options for local authorities to appoint external auditors:

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- establishing their own auditor panel (which may be an existing committee or sub-committee of the authority);
- jointly establishing an auditor panel with other authorities;
- using the services of an auditor panel established by another authority; or
- delegating appointment to a sector led body.

He detailed these options and suggested that the consensus amongst most local authorities was to pursue the fourth option and to delegate appointment to a sector led body. In July 2016 Public Sector Audit Appointments (PSAA) were specified by the Secretary of State as an appointing person under regulation 3 of the Local Audit (Appointing Person) Regulations 2015.

The Audit and Governance Committee, at its meeting held on 23 November 2016, had considered the options and had supported this option also.

The Executive supported the recommendation now detailed.

<u>RECOMMENDED</u> – that East Herts Council "opts in" to the appointing person arrangements made by Public Sector Audit Appointments (PSAA) for the appointment of External Auditors.

467 **RISK MANAGEMENT STRATEGY - UPDATE**

The Executive Member for Finance and Support Services submitted a report reviewing and updating the Risk Management Strategy.

The Executive noted that the Risk Management Strategy was reviewed annually. On 16 March 2016, the updated Strategy had been considered by the Audit Committee, who had supported the amendments in principle, but had requested that changes to the senior management structure be reflected before submission to the Executive.

The Audit and Governance Committee, at its meeting held on 23 November 2016, had considered and supported the revised Strategy as now detailed.

The Executive supported the revised Strategy as now detailed.

<u>RECOMMENDED</u> – that (A) the comments of Audit Committee be received; and

(B) the updated Risk Management Strategy, as now submitted, be approved.

469 GOVIA THAMESLINK RAILWAY (GTR) 2018 TIMETABLE CONSULTATION , SEPTEMBER 2016

The Executive Member for Economic Development submitted a report detailing the public consultation by Govia Thameslink Railway (GTR) on its proposed 2018 timetable and seeking approval for the Council's response. The consultation covered the Great Northern (including Metro), Gatwick Express, Southern and Thameslink lines, and would come into force following completion of the Thameslink Programme.

The Executive Member highlighted the key issues affecting East Herts, namely that, due to the provision of other services on the East Coast Main Line coupled with the postponement of delivery of a fifth platform at Stevenage to provide a turnback facility for the Hertford Loop service, from May 2018 there would be a cessation of rail services between Watton-at-Stone and Stevenage during all peak and most off-peak times. He emphasised that this was being challenged robustly in the proposed response.

Various Members commented on this aspect of the new timetable being unacceptable to East Herts residents.

The Executive Member referred to the Council's proposed response to this and other proposals in Essential Reference Paper 'B' of the report submitted.

The Executive approved the recommendation now detailed.

<u>RESOLVED</u> - that Govia Thameslink Railway be informed that, in respect of its 2018 Timetable Consultation, East Herts Council submits comments at Essential Reference Paper 'B' to the report submitted as its response in respect of the questions within the consultation and other specific matters which it wishes to raise.

470 HCC TRANSPORT VISION 2050 CONSULTATION

The Executive Member for Economic Development submitted a report detailing the public consultation by Hertfordshire County Council (HCC) on its draft Transport Vision 2050 and sought approval for the Council's response to it. He highlighted the range of issues relevant to East Herts and detailed the proposed response at Essential Reference Paper 'B' of the report submitted.

In particular, he noted the lack of information on connections beyond the county boundary, for example at Stansted and Luton airports. As a whole, the Vision seemed focussed on urban areas and did not address rural concerns. He also referred to the principle of a bypass around Hertford, although there was no information on a route or the impact on air quality issues.

The Executive approved the recommendation now detailed.

<u>RESOLVED</u> - that Hertfordshire County Council be informed that, in respect of its Transport Vision 2050 consultation, East Herts Council:

(A) supports the principle of developing the Vision as a rationale to underpin emerging Local Transport Plan 4; and

(B) submits comments at Essential Reference Paper 'B' to the report submitted as its response in respect of the questions within the consultation and other specific matters which it wishes to raise.

471 CAR PARK FEES AND CHARGES 2017/18

The Executive Member for Economic Development submitted a report seeking approval for proposed increases to the car parking income budget to be effective from April 2017.

The Executive Member advised that car park charges in East Herts had remained the same since 2010/11 and in some cases had been reduced. Since then, the Council had reduced its short stay tariffs in September 2014 as part of a two year trial, resulting in the erosion, in real terms, of the value of the Council's car park income by nearly 12%, since 2010/11.

The Executive Member further advised that new "pay and display" machines had been installed offering improved functionality, including the facility to pay by credit/debit card and the option to pay on exit. The Executive noted the increased operating and licensing costs.

The Executive Member also referred to alternate options for tariff changes at Essential Reference Paper 'C' of the report submitted and small changes in some car parks at Essential Reference Paper 'E' of the report submitted. The Corporate Business Scrutiny Committee, at its meeting held on 29 November 2016, had considered the proposals and had supported the proposed increases. The Committee had expressed a preference for the tariff changes set out in the option detailed at Essential Reference Paper 'C2'. Although some Members had supported the idea that there should be no increase in charges until the impact of the new machines had been assessed and a Task and Finish Group had been established to review the wider issue of car parking and Sunday charging, this had not been supported by the Committee.

Councillors S Bull and J Jones both commented on the impact of the proposed changes on Buntingford and the reduction in the free parking period. They argued that Buntingford should be treated as a special case, given it was the only town in East Herts without a train station.

The Executive Member responded by suggesting that Buntingford was being treated as a special case, as the free parking period would still be an hour longer than other towns in the District. He reminded Members of the need to meet the Medium Term Financial Plan and the equity in asking all to contribute.

The Executive supported the proposals as now detailed.

<u>RESOLVED</u> - that (A) the comments of Corporate Business Scrutiny Committee be received;

(B) the car parking income budget be increased by 7.5% from April 2017;

(C) the option for tariff changes as set out in
 Essential Reference Paper 'C2' of the report submitted,
 be approved;

(D) changes to a small number of the Council's car parks as detailed at Essential Reference Paper 'E' of

the report submitted, be approved;

(E) the advertisement of a Traffic Regulation Order to give legal effect to these changes be authorised; and

(F) the resolution by Officers of all Traffic Regulation Order objections received using existing delegated powers, be confirmed.

472 HERTFORD CONSERVATION AREA APPRAISAL AND MANAGEMENT PLAN

The Executive Member for Development Management and Council Support submitted a report on the Hertford Conservation Area Appraisal following public consultation. She detailed the outcome of the public consultation in the report now submitted.

The Appraisal identified the special character of the Conservation Area together with the elements that should be retained or enhanced and those which detracted from the identified character. Once adopted by the Council, the Appraisal would become a 'material consideration' in the process of determining planning applications. It would also link into the development of neighbourhood planning.

Councillor P Ruffles commended the thoroughness of the work undertaken by the Conservation Officer but suggested that further consideration be given to the proposed exclusion of some properties on Tamworth Road. He believed that residents were entitled to a better understanding of the reasons for treating apparently similar properties in a different manner. The Executive Member accepted this request for the matter to be deferred to the next meeting.

The Executive agreed to defer the report to allow for the boundary line at Tamworth Road to be reconsidered.

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that the report be deferred to the next meeting for the reasons now detailed.

474 CHAIRMAN'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Chairman welcomed Victoria Clothier, Legal Services Manager, to her first meeting providing legal support to the Committee.

475 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillor M Casey declared a disclosable pecuniary interest in application S/16/0276/PREAPP, in that he was a shareholder in National Grid Plc. He left the room whilst this matter was considered.

Councillor R Standley declared that she would leave the room whilst application 3/16/2087/VAR was considered on the grounds that she was a Member of the Network Housing Group Panel. She explained that whilst she did not consider that she had a disclosable pecuniary interest, she would not participate in the debate to avoid any perception of bias.

476 MINUTES – 9 NOVEMBER 2016

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that the Minutes of the meeting held on 9 November 2016 be confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

477 3/16/2072/FUL – DEMOLITION OF OFFICES, CHANGE OF USE OF LAND TO CREATE CAR PARK WITH ASSOCIATED LANDSCAPING AT THE CAUSEWAY, NO ONE BUILDING, BISHOP'S STORTFORD, CM23 2ER FOR EAST HERTS COUNCIL

> The Head of Planning and Building Control recommended that in respect of application 3/16/2072/FUL, planning permission be granted subject to the conditions detailed in the report now submitted.

> The Head summarised the application and commented on the unlikelihood of future occupiers being found for the building. Members were reminded that the site was part of a wider area that was the subject of a planning framework consultation.

The Head stated that the proposed change of use would provide car parking for the existing users of Charringtons House as well as additional public parking. Officers were DM

satisfied that any harm caused as a result of the proposals was outweighed by the benefits. Officers felt that the proposed development was acceptable subject to conditions regarding the management of the car park.

Councillor K Warnell commented on the feasibility of an archaeological survey if the foundations of the building remained in place. He also commented on the mitigation of dust resulting from the proposed demolition work. The Head stated that Officers had attached a condition regarding archaeological works and issue of dust was covered by Environmental Health legislation but a condition could be added requiring that details of demolition and dust mitigation be submitted to and agreed by Officers.

Councillor B Deering referred to the issue of tree planting and landscaping and queried the availability of 100 spaces on Sundays compared to half that number on Saturdays. The Head advised that the Charringtons House tenants required more Saturday spaces hence the reduced number of public spaces compared to the higher level of Sunday provision.

Members were advised that due to the temporary nature of the proposed car park, a condition for additional tree planting was unnecessary as it took time for trees to become established. Officers reminded Members that the Authority retained a degree of control over the site given that it was the applicant.

Councillor B Deering proposed and Councillor K Warnell seconded, a motion for additional conditions regarding additional planting and the mitigation of dust resulting from the proposed demolition of the offices. After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, this motion was declared CARRIED. The Committee accepted the recommendation of the Head of Planning and Building Control as now submitted.

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that in respect of application

3/16/2072/FUL, planning permission be granted subject to the following amended conditions:

- 1. Three Year Time Limit (1T12)
- 2. Programme of archaeological work (2E02)
- 3. Approved Plans (2E10)

Summary of Reasons for Decision

East Herts Council has considered the applicant's proposal in a positive and proactive manner with regard to the policies of the Development Plan; the National Planning Policy Framework and in accordance with the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015 (as amended). The balance of the considerations having regard to those policies is that permission should be granted. 478 3/16/1251/REM – APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL OF RESERVED MATTERS FOR 3/13/0886/0P FOR THE LAYOUT OF THE FIRST PHASE OF THE INTERNAL ROAD NETWORK, THE LANDSCAPE BUFFER ADJACENT TO THE A 120, HAZEL END ROAD AND FARNHAM ROAD AND THE LAYOUT AND DETAILS OF LANDSCAPING FOR THE NEW RIVERSIDE PARK ADJACENT TO HAZEL END ROAD, INCLUDING INTERNAL FOOTPATHS, PLANTING PLAN, VISITORS CAR PARK, ATTENUATION PONDS AND ACCESS ROAD AT LAND BETWEEN FARNHAM ROAD AND HAZEL END ROAD, BISHOP'S STORTFORD, CM23 1JJ FOR COUNTRYSIDE PROPERTIES

> The Head of Planning and Building Control recommended that in respect of application 3/16/1251/REM, reserved matters planning permission be granted subject to the conditions detailed in the report now submitted.

The Head advised that outline permission had been approved and this reserved matters application formed part of the wider Bishop's Stortford North development proposals. The scheme was for a revised access and layout of the spine road through the site, landscaping and footways adjacent to the spine road, landscaping within the proposed riverside park open space and landscaping around the circumference of the site.

The Head detailed a number of issues for Members to consider including policies of the East Herts Local Plan Second Review April 2007, the National Planning Policy Framework and Neighbourhood Plan policies. He referred to the principles of garden cities and referred Members to the additional representations summary. He advised Members that the legal agreement and first condition that were detailed in the report were not required in this case.

Councillor P Ruffles referred to the comments of the Ramblers Society regarding the plans displaying the public rights of way. Councillor K Warnell expressed concerns that future residents faced an additional DM

financial burden if Hertfordshire Highways did not take responsibility for new roads proposed as part of this application. He also commented on noise related matters and stressed that construction traffic should enter and leave the site from outside of the town centre of Bishop's Stortford.

The Head stated that arrangements would be made for a temporary access to this site directly from the A120 and the details of this would be submitted to and agreed with Hertfordshire Highways. He also referred to Hazel End Road and the proposed Riverside Park and steps that would be taken to avoid a burden being placed upon Rye Street.

Members were advised that public footpaths to be provided on the riverside park would link with the existing network. The provision of other elements, such as the open space elements of the proposed development were covered by the existing legal agreement. Members were reminded that Hertfordshire Highways were seeking to limit its future liabilities with regard to the adoption of roads. With regard to management costs of roads, the highway authority preferred not to adopt roads with roadside verges with trees between the carriageway and footway. A management company approach was not an uncommon arrangement for the maintenance costs of roads not managed by highways.

The Legal Services Manager reminded the Committee of what may constitute a material consideration, and gave an example in that the negative effect on the value of a property would not constitute one. The Head confirmed that the longer term management safeguards were detailed in the report and the additional representations summary.

After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, the Committee accepted the recommendation of the Head of Planning and Building Control as now submitted. <u>RESOLVED</u> – that in respect of application 3/16/1251/REM, reserved matters planning permission be granted subject to the conditions detailed in the report.

The Head advised that this first phase development was on the same site detailed at Minute 478. He detailed the roundabout access off Farnham Road and stated that the application was for 91 dwellings of which 22 or 24.2% would be affordable.

Members were reminded that based upon the legal agreement requirement of 25% affordable housing, this site would provide marginally under this percentage. Officers were comfortable however, that the other phases of development would ensure that the overall affordable housing provision would be 25%.

The Head confirmed that this scheme met the aspiration of delivering a high quality development which had been established at the outline stage. Councillor K Warnell made a number of points in support of the application. He was concerned however, that the site would be isolated from the Bishop's Stortford town centre until ASR sites 1-4 were completed.

The Head confirmed to Councillor J Goodeve that the site managed itself in terms of parking provision for the

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affordable housing units as this part of the site had a dedicated access and associated parking area. Councillor K Warnell was assured by Officers that contributions towards public transport provision had been addressed by the outline application.

After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, the Committee accepted the recommendation of the Head of Planning and Building Control as now submitted.

Mr Francis addressed the Committee in objection to the application.

The Head of Planning and Building Control recommended that in respect of application 3/16/0452/FUL, planning permission be granted subject to a legal agreement and the conditions detailed in the report now submitted.

The Head stated that the site was within the settlement boundary of Bishop's Stortford and was part of site ASR4 in the East Herts Local Plan Second Review April 2007. The site was not allocated as part of the Bishop's Stortford north sites in the emerging District Plan. Officers had considered the scheme against the Local Plan, District Plan policies and the policies of the Neighbourhood Plan.

The Head referred to a green margin to the front of the site and commented on improved cycle way provision with the potential for longer term linkages. He referred to highways matters and the issue of flood risk and concluded that the benefits of the proposed development outweighed any harm.

Councillor D Andrews emphasised his concerns regarding flooding. He referred to the lack of objection or conditions from the authority responsible for flood mitigation and commented on conditions regarding Sustainable Urban Drainage Solutions (SuDs) or permeable paving. He also expressed concern that the affordable housing units were to be located in one cluster which was contrary to the guidance in the Affordable Housing SPD that affordable units should be pepperDM

potted on the site.

Following comments from Councillor M Casey, the Head emphasised that the County Council had been testing options for the delivery of a 3 form entry (3FE) primary school with an access off Farnham Road. Members were also advised that the preferred flood risk mitigation measures were the solutions at the softer end of the spectrum such as swale ponds.

Councillor K Warnell referred to policy HDP1 and garden city development principles. Following further queries from Councillors M Casey and the Chairman regarding school provision, the Head detailed the planned arrangements for school provision in the area of this site and the wider ASRs.

The Head referred to affordable housing and the Strategic Housing Market Assessment (SHMA) and emphasised the importance of meeting the most pressing local housing need. He also referred to the local Neighbourhood Plan definition of garden city principles and detailed the wording of policy HDP1 in that there would be access to sustainable green spaces.

After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, the Committee accepted the recommendation of the Head of Planning and Building Control as now submitted.

Mr Waite addressed the Committee in objection to the application. Mr Poole spoke for the application. The Head of Planning and Building Control recommended that in respect of application 3/16/1391/FUL, planning

permission be refused for the reasons detailed in the report now submitted.

The Head advised that the site was located within the settlement boundary of Buntingford and an approval of planning permission would result in the loss of an employment site. Officers were concerned regarding the impact of the scheme on the occupiers of sites to the north and the impact of the proposed development on services and infrastructure.

Officers had recommended the application for refusal due to the loss of employment land, the density and layout of the proposals and lack of suitable linkages to the land to the west of the site. Environmental Health Officers were also concerned regarding noise and disturbance from the adjacent employment area.

Councillor J Jones expressed concerns that Buntingford needed employment sites and there were plenty of sites which were already earmarked for housing. He stressed that this site was designated as employment land in the emerging District Plan and the Neighbourhood Plan. He pointed out that the footpath to the west should link with a footpath to two schools and the associated playing fields. He concluded that the scheme was purely speculative in nature and the application was of poor quality and was poorly designed.

Councillor M Freeman emphasised that employment land was needed to avoid residents having to use cars for work, particularly in light of the infrequent bus services. He referred to the opportunist approach of the applicant with this scheme.

The Head responded in detail to a query from the Committee Chairman regarding the demand for employment land. Members were advised that this land should be retained for employment purposes during the District Plan period as the demand will increase as housing development is delivered in Buntingford. The Head provided a definition of policies EDE1 and BUN6 in response to a query from Councillor R Brunton. After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, the Committee accepted the recommendation of the Head of Planning and Building Control as now submitted.

Mr Miles addressed the Committee in objection to the application. Mr Downes spoke for the application.

The Head of Planning and Building Control recommended that in respect of application 3/15/0260/FUL, planning permission be granted subject to a legal agreement and the conditions detailed in the report now submitted.

The Head explained that for all rural locations in East Herts, including its villages, the degree to which development would be fully sustainable had to be a balance given that the majority of education, employment and retail provision was located in the larger urban settlements and therefore, many residents would travel to these larger centres. Members were reminded that there was a deficit in the 5 years supply of housing land and applications for sustainable development should be approved unless the harm could be proved to be both significant and demonstrable.

Members were advised of a number of local heritage assets and Officers felt that the setting of these assets would be improved by the proposed development, or at worse, neutrally affected. The site was well contained by a landscape boundary and the impact was not considered to be harmful and Officers were therefore supportive of the scheme.

The Head responded to comments from Councillor R Brunton regarding policies EDE1 and EDE2 as well as comments from Councillor J Jones regarding the previous brownfield use of the site. Officers were of the view that the marketing approach that had been taken was acceptable.

Following further comments from Councillors R Brunton, K Warnell and the Committee Chairman, the Head confirmed that the site was separate from Hunsdon and was outside the main body of the village. A majority of residents used cars to access schools, jobs, doctor's surgeries or for shopping trips. Members were advised that there was some roadside footpath provision between the site and Hunsdon.

After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, the Committee accepted the recommendation of the Head of Planning and Building Control as now submitted.

The Head of Planning and Building Control recommended

that in respect of application S/16/0276/PREAPP, the hazardous substances consent be revoked. The Head advised that this was a rare situation following the granting of Hazardous Substances Consent (HSC) in 1992 for the storage of natural gas.

Members were advised that the owners of the site, the National Grid, had not used the site for the storage of natural gas for many years and wished to sell it. The presence of the HSC served no purpose and might act as a barrier to new development and the revocation was therefore necessary to remove the safeguarding restrictions to enable redevelopment for sensitive purposes such as a residential use.

The Head responded to a query from Councillor D Andrews regarding possible contamination of the site. He stated that the revocation had no implications for necessary decontamination. After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, the Committee accepted the recommendation of the Head of Planning and Building Control as now submitted.

486 ESBIES ESTATE, SAWBRIDGEWORTH – UPDATE ON ENFORCEMENT ISSUES

The Head of Planning and Building Control submitted a report updating Members on the current situation relating to enforcement matters at the Esbies Estate, off Station Road, Sawbridgeworth. The report sought to obtain authorisation to pursue further action at the site where previous enforcement notices had not been complied with and/or further unauthorised development had occurred.

The Head summarised what was a long and detailed history of enforcement action, the full detail of which could be found in Essential Reference Paper 'B' of the report submitted. A number of appeals had been submitted and subsequently dismissed by the planning inspectorate. This report sought Members' authority to secure compliance with enforcement notices and for future action regarding any further breaches of planning control.

Members were given a summary of the suggested ways forward and were referred to the report for the detailed implications of each option. The Legal Services Manager confirmed to Councillor D Andrews that the recommendation should be amended on the basis that Officers be authorised to seek rather than serve an injunction.

Following a number of initial queries from Members, the Committee was advised that a QC had informally suggested the proposed way forward and more formal advice would be obtained should Members approve the recommendation.

Members asked a number of questions regarding the financial implications and the option of prosecuting the owners of the various plots. The Legal Services Manger emphasised that prosecutions would not compel the owners to comply with existing enforcement notices or prevent further breaches.

The Head stated that there was no one combined owner of the plots of land and some plots were in common ownership. The financial implications were very difficult to quantify regarding each of the suggested ways forward. Councillor K Warnell made reference to the human rights of the individual owners of the plots on the Esbies Estate.

Members received the report and approved the recommendation now detailed.

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that Officers be authorised to seek an injunction under Section 187B of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 to secure compliance with the extant enforcement notices across the site; together with any unauthorised development that has occurred since the service of Notices in 2010, and also to prevent any further unauthorised development at the site.

At this point (9.52 pm), the Committee passed a resolution that the meeting should continue until the completion of the remaining business on the agenda.

456 <u>APOLOGIES</u>

Apologies for absence were submitted on behalf of Councillors B Deering, P Phillips and M Stevenson. It was noted that Councillor D Oldridge was substituting for Councillor M Stevenson.

457 <u>MINUTES – 11 OCTOBER 2016</u>

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that the Minutes of the meeting held on 11 October 2016 be confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

458 CHAIRMAN'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Chairman reminded Members that it was their responsibility to arrange substitutes for Scrutiny meetings and they should inform Democratic Services of any substitution arrangements 24 hours before the start of the meeting.

459 PRESENTATION ON DIGITAL EAST HERTS

The Director (Adele Taylor) and the National Graduate Development Programme (NGDP) Graduate Trainee gave a presentation on Digital East Herts. They provided Members with an introduction to Digital East Herts and advised the Committee what it was and was not designed to achieve.

Members were advised that Digital East Herts was not solely about the website and this programme was also focussed on customer interactions and engagement. Members were provided with the story so far and the proposed next steps. Officers responded to a number of questions and queries from Members. The Committee received the presentation.

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that the presentation on Digital East Herts be received.

460 BUSINESS SUPPORT AND INVESTMENT PROGRAMMES IN EAST HERTS

The Executive Member for Economic Development submitted a report that provided an early Scrutiny opportunity for the Business Support and Investment elements of the Council's Economic Vision 2016 – 2020. The Economic Development Manager summarised a number of key points in the report and detailed the four business support/investment themes that the Authority was committed to delivering.

The Economic Development Manager and the Head of Strategic Finance and Property responded to a number of comments and queries raised by the Committee. The Deputy Leader and Executive Member for Economic Development also responded to a number of further questions from Members.

Members received the report and supported the recommendation now detailed.

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that the extension of the current Service Level Agreement (SLA) arrangements with Wenta for a further year to 31 March 2018 to allow further consideration of the issues detailed in paragraph 3.3 of the report submitted, be supported.

461 CAR PARK FEES AND CHARGES 2017/18

The Executive Member for Economic Development submitted a report seeking the Committee's support for an overall 7.5% increase to car park budgets from April 2017. The report also sought to ascertain the Committee's preferred approach to implementing car park tariff changes as well as the Committee's support for additional proposals affecting a small number of the Council's car parks. The Parking Manager advised that car park charges had remained unchanged for some years and in some cases had been reduced. Members were advised that when measuring inflation via the Consumer Prices Index (CPI), the value of the Council's car parking income had been eroded in real terms by nearly 12%.

Members were advised that the Council's decision to absorb the increase in the rate of VAT in 2011 had further eroded income. Car park charges had been unchanged and in some cases had reduced over the last six years and as the costs of operating the service would increase, it was proposed to increase tariffs from 2017/18.

The Parking Manager advised that although the proposed changes would deliver savings in some areas, costs would increase in others. The Council would pay a charge every time a credit or debit card was used and it was anticipated that these charges would amount to £50,000 per annum. Also, new operating and licencing costs associated with the new machines were projected to cost a further £27,000 per annum.

Following initial comments from Councillor M Casey, the Executive Member for Economic Development stated that the proposals would not discourage town centre parking and the 7.5% increase was in line with the Council's own policies. The Director (Adele Taylor) emphasised that the extra revenue would cover the costs of other elements of the service such as the work of the Civil Enforcement Officers (CEOs).

Members were advised that the check in/check out process would reduce frequent overpaying by motorists and would assist in the avoidance of Penalty Charge Notices (PCNs). The Parking Manager explained the check in/check out process.

Following queries from Councillors J Kaye, M Pope and D Oldridge, the Parking Manager explained in more detail the rationale for the changes and the loss of blue badge

bays. He explained that the loss of the smart cards was due to the functionality of the new machines and was mitigated by increasing charges towards short stay tariffs, subject to approval. He explained the operating procedures and costs associated with the work of CEOs and summarised the main differences between the options detailed in Essential Reference Papers C(1) and C(2) of the report submitted.

Councillor J Wyllie commented on whether the Council could charge for Sunday parking on the basis that the additional income would avoid weekday tariff increases. The Parking Manager advised that Sunday charging could lose the Council money due to the need to employ CEOs on Sundays. The Executive Member for Economic Development added that Sunday charging could cause on-street parking problems as yellow lines were not currently enforced on Sundays.

Councillor J Wyllie proposed and Councillor M Pope seconded, a motion that there should be no increase in charges until the impact of the new machines had been assessed and a Task and Finish Group should be established to review the wider issue of car parking and Sunday charging.

After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, this motion was declared LOST. Members received the report and supported the recommendations now detailed.

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that (A) the proposal to increase car parking charges by 7.5% from April 2017 be recommended to the Executive for approval;

(B) the Executive be advised that Corporate
 Business Scrutiny supports the approach to tariff
 changes detailed in Essential Reference Paper
 C(2) to the report submitted; and

(C) the proposed changes to a small number of the Council's car parks be recommended to the

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Executive for approval.

462 HOUSING COMPANY BUSINESS PLAN

The Executive Member for Economic Development read out a statement relevant to the report on behalf of the Ambassador and Executive Member for Shared Services.

The Head of Housing and Health and the Head of Strategic Finance and Property submitted a report that covered the establishment of a housing company, wholly owned by East Herts Council, to provide revenue income to offset diminishing government support and grants and meet the Council's objectives in terms of providing quality housing opportunities.

The report included a 30 year business plan for this first stage of the proposed company's operation drawing on advice provided by Trowers and Hamlins and PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC). The proposal did not cover housing development and a principal aim was to generate an additional income stream for the Authority.

Members were advised of financial matters that were relevant to the proposed Housing Company. Members were also provided with a number of property and rent assumptions. Members were invited to scrutinise the business case and business plan.

Councillor M Casey stated that, he felt the assumptions in the report were optimistic and based on his reanalysis of the figures, the margins were not sufficient to justify the investment and future decision making on this issue. Councillor M Pope stated that he was in favour of the concept and endorsed Councillor M Casey's call to reassess the business case.

The Head of Housing and Health advised that local data had been used for the figures detailed in the report. He stressed that consideration had been given to the equity, debt and loan to value ratios that would be acceptable to the private market.

The Head of Strategic Finance and Property stated that the Housing Company would provide a cash flow that would avoid the need for savings elsewhere in the Council. Following comments from Councillors D Oldridge and J Wyllie, the Head advised that the proposal was to provide private rental housing using local authorities' 'general power of competence'. Use of this power required the activity to be conducted by a company, not directly by a council. The Director (Adele Taylor) reminded Members that the Authority was restricted in terms of where and how it could invest.

The Leader commented on the possibility of arranging training for Members to be delivered by other Authorities, covering their experience of setting up a housing company.

Following other comments from Members, the Committee was advised that the income generated from this proposal would go towards mitigating the Council's savings targets. The Head of Housing and Health reminded Members that there was a further opportunity for scrutinising the proposals at the joint meeting of Scrutiny Committees in January 2017.

Councillor J Wyllie proposed and Councillor M Pope seconded, a motion that the recommendations from Scrutiny Members on the Housing Company Business Plan be deferred to the joint meeting of Scrutiny Committees scheduled for 17 January 2017.

After being put to the meeting and a vote taken, this motion was declared CARRIED. The Committee supported the recommendations now detailed.

<u>RESOLVED</u> – that a decision on whether to endorse the full business case and 30 year business plan be deferred to the joint meeting of Scrutiny Committees on 17 January 2017.

463 QUARTERLY CORPORATE HEALTHCHECK – QUARTER 2 SEPTEMBER 2016

The Head of Strategic Finance and Property and the Head of Communications, Strategy and Policy submitted a report updating Members on finance and performance monitoring for East Herts Council for 2016/17 as at September 2016. Officers provided a summary of the report in relation to revenue budget forecasts, capital schemes and performance indicators.

Officers responded to a number of detailed queries from the Committee. Members received the report and supported the recommendations now detailed.

RESOLVED - that (A) the report be received;

(B) the revenue budget forecast overspend of $\pm 177k$ in 2016/17, as detailed in paragraph 2.1 of the report submitted, be noted;

(C) the capital forecast underspend of £1,576K, as detailed in paragraph 6.1of the report submitted, be noted; and

(D) the reported performance for the period August to October 2016 be noted.

464 SCRUTINY WORK PROGRAMME

The Chairman invited Members to review the Committee's future work programme for 2016/17. The Scrutiny Officer advised that that the deferred decisions regarding the Housing Company Business Case would be reported to the joint meeting of Scrutiny Committees on 17 January 2017.

NATIONAL NON-DOMESTIC RATES RETURN - DELEGATED AUTHORITY

WARD(S) AFFECTED: ALL

Purpose/Summary of Report

 To ensure an appropriate approval process is in place for the setting of the National Non-Domestic Rates Budget for 2017/18 and future years. This will enable submission of the National Non-Domestic Rates (NNDR1) return to Central Government and Hertfordshire County Council by the statutory deadline of 31st January 2017 without the need for additional Council meetings.

RECO	OMMENDATIONS FOR COUNCIL: That:
(A)	authority to approve and submit the annual National Non- Domestic Rates (NNDR1) return to Central Government be delegated to the Section 151 Officer in consultation with the Executive Member for Finance and Support Services for 2017/18 and future years; and
(B)	the delegation scheme in the Council Constitution be amended to reflect this authorisation and the Monitoring Officer be authorised to make the consequential textual amendments.

- 1.0 <u>Background</u>
- 1.1 Under the provisions of the Non-Domestic Rating (Rates Retention) Regulations 2013 the Council is required, on or before 31st January, to estimate and notify Central government and Hertfordshire County Council of the amount of its share of non-

domestic rates for the relevant year. This information is collated and submitted on a NNDR1 form.

- 1.2 The Business Rate Retention scheme came into effect on 1st April 2013. Under this scheme a proportion of National Non-Domestic Rates (NNDR) is retained by local Government. The NNDR1 form is a key document in the budget setting process which provides financial estimates of retained business rates and surplus/deficit position on the Collection Fund which both East Herts and Hertfordshire County Council require to complete their budget for the upcoming year.
- 1.3 In previous years the NNDR1 and estimates that it contains have been approved at a Council meeting in January as part of the budget setting process as set out in the Constitution.
- 2.0 <u>Report</u>
- 2.1 The 2017/18 NNDR1 form will contain estimates of the collectible non-domestic rates and the balance on the collection fund as at 31st March 2017. In order to produce these estimates officers use software from Capita (the Council's software provider), reports from consultants regarding value of appeals, along with local knowledge and professional judgement.
- 2.2 A revaluation of rateable values has been carried out by the Valuation Office and will come into effect on 1st April 2017. This impacts all hereditaments on the East Herts rating list, with both increases and decreases in valuation. The impact of this revaluation, to both local and central government will offset by a change to the multiplier (the gross value of rates payable across the country will not change).
- 2.3 There will however be changes, both up and down, to the rates paid by individual rate payers; these will be phased in using a series of transitional reliefs. These transitional reliefs are set based on legislation from Central Government.
- 2.4 In order to estimate the impact of this revaluation and subsequent entitlement to reliefs, officers will be using the end of year software release from Capita which is not expected to be received until late January 2017 due to the need to reflect legislation.
- 2.5 A communication received from the Department of Communities and Local Government (DCLG) indicates that the 2017/18 NNDR1

form will be sent to local authorities on the 16th December 2016, although there is a caveat that this date is subject to change. It is anticipated that, as in previous years, there will be amendments to the form before the final draft is received.

- 2.6 This potential late publication of the NNDR1 form, legislative changes and delayed software release will impact on the time available to officers to complete and submit the 2017/18 NNDR1 by 31st January 2017.
- 2.7 The proposal to delegate authority to approve the Non-Domestic rates budget and NNDR1 will ensure that statutory deadlines are met without the need for additional Council meetings. Details of retained business rates will be reported to Council as part of the budget setting process.
- 3.0 Implications/Consultations
