

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In April 2015 Public Sector Audit Appointments Ltd (PSAA) issued "Statement of responsibilities of auditors and audited bodies". Executive Summary

Scope update

In our Audit Planning Report presented to the 13 March 2018 Performance, Audit and Governance Scrutiny Committee meeting, we provided you with an overview of our audit scope and approach for the audit of the financial statements. We carried out our audit in accordance with this plan. We provide an update on our materiality and key risks below

- ► Changes in materiality: In our Audit Planning Report, we communicated that our audit procedures would be performed using a materiality of £1.53 million, but that we would update this at year end. This level of materiality changed with the actual results for the financial year to £1.1 million. The basis of our assessment has remained consistent with prior years at 2% of gross expenditure on provision of services. The threshold for reporting misstatements that have an effect on the primary statements (comprehensive income and expenditure statement, balance sheet, movement in reserves statement, cash flow statement and collection fund is £0.076 million.
- Changes in risks: In our Audit Planning Report, we communicated our significant risk in relation to the accounts and value for money conclusion. Following receipt of the draft accounts and undertaking our work during the audit, the risks remain consistent with our initial assessment.

Status of the audit

We have substantially completed our audit of East Hertfordshire District Council's financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2018 and have performed the procedures outlined in our Audit Planning Report. Subject to satisfactory completion of the following outstanding items, we expect to issue an unqualified opinion on the Authority's financial statements in the form which appears at Section 3. However until work is complete, further amendments may arise:

- · Journals testing
- Payroll testing
- Final Audit Manager and Associate Partner review of the audit work completed
- Review of the final version of the financial statements
- Completion of subsequent events review
- · Receipt of the signed management representation letter

We expect to issue the audit certificate at the same time as the audit opinion.

Executive Summary

Audit differences

There are no unadjusted audit differences arising from our audit.

We have identified a small number audit differences which have been adjusted by management. Details can be found in Section 5 Audit Differences.

There are no matters, apart from those reported by management or disclosed in this report, which we believe should be brought to the attention of the Performance, Audit and Governance Scrutiny Committee.

Value for money

We have considered your arrangements to take informed decisions; deploy resources in a sustainable manner; and work with partners and other third parties. In our Audit Planning Report we identified a significant risk in relation to the development of Old River Lane, establishment of a housing company and the review of the leisure strategy.

We have completed the procedures outlined in our Audit Planning Report to address this risk and as a result have concluded that we have no matters to report about your arrangements to secure economy efficiency and effectiveness in your use of resources.

Other reporting issues

We have reviewed the information presented in the Annual Governance Statement for consistency with our knowledge of the Authority. We have no matters to report as a result of this work.

The Council is below the threshold set by the National Audit Office (NAO) for the Whole of Government Accounts submission. Therefore we do not have any procedures to undertake and have no issues to report.

We have no other matters to report.

Independence

Significant risk

Misstatements due to fraud or error



What is the risk?

The financial statements as a whole are not free of material misstatements whether caused by fraud or error.

As identified in ISA (UK and Ireland) 240, management is in a unique position to perpetrate fraud because of its ability to manipulate accounting records directly or indirectly and prepare fraudulent financial statements by overriding controls that otherwise appear to be operating effectively. We identify and respond to this fraud risk on every audit engagement.

For the Council, we identified the potential for the incorrect classification of revenue spend as capital as a particular area where there is a risk of misstatement.

What judgements are we focused on?

We focused on aspects of the financial statements where management could inappropriately inflate income or understate expenditure, primarily:

- > Material accounting estimates.
- > Accruals near year end
- > Journal entries.
- Unusual transactions.

What did we do?

- Enquired of management, those charged with governance, Internal Audit and Monitoring Officer about risks of fraud and the controls put in place to address those risks.
- Understood the oversight given by those charged with governance of management's processes over fraud.
- Considered the effectiveness of management's controls designed to address the risk of fraud.
- Determined an appropriate strategy to address those identified risks of fraud.
- Performed mandatory procedures regardless of specifically identified fraud risks, including testing of journal entries recorded in the general ledger and other adjustments made in the preparation of the financial statements.
- Assessed accounting estimates for evidence of management bias;
- Evaluated the business rationale for significant unusual transactions; and
- Reviewed capital expenditure on property, plant and equipment to ensure it meets the relevant accounting requirements to be capitalised, should the final sum be material.

What are our conclusions?

We have not identified any material weaknesses in controls or evidence of material management override.

We have not identified any instances of inappropriate judgements being applied.

We did not identify any other transactions during our audit which appeared unusual or outside the Authority's normal course of business.

We did not identify any capital expenditure which had been inappropriately capitalised.

Overall, our audit work has not identified any material issues, inappropriate judgements or unusual transactions which indicate that there has been any misreporting of the Authority's financial position or that management has overridden controls.



Significant risk

Investment property valuation (Old River Lane)

What judgements are we focused on?

Old River Lane site was purchased by the Council during 2015 and classified as an investment asset in the Council's 2015/16 and 2016/17 accounts.

The Council is continuing to develop its proposal for the use of this site which will eventually result in changes in its classification. Due to the material nature of the asset, small changes in assumptions when valuing it could have a material impact on the Council's financial statements.

What judgements are we focused on?

Assumptions made by internal valuers in valuing Old River.

What did we do?

- Assessed the classification of the Old River Lane assets, the valuation basis that is assigned as a result and any material increases or impairments that arise during 2017/18
- Assessed the work of the property valuers in respect of the Council's Investment Property portfolio
- Identified the key assumptions and valuation methodology for the Old River Lane assets
- Reviewed and tested the accounting entries and disclosures made within the Council's financial statements.

What are our conclusions?

We confirmed that Old River Lane was correctly classified as Investment Property.

We confirmed that the property was measured accurately at fair value through the rental income it generates.

Assessed the work of the internal valuers in respect of this specific property and concluded assumptions made to be reasonable

Confirmed that the accounting entries and disclosures made in respect of this property within the Council's financial statements were accurate and complete.

Overall financial statement disclosure were fairly stated in respect of Old River Lane



Other Areas of Audit Focus

Property, plant and equipment valuations

What is the risk?

Property, plant and equipment (PPE) represents a significant balance in the Council's accounts and are subject to valuation changes, impairment reviews and depreciation charges.

Material judgemental inputs and estimation techniques are required to calculate the year-end PPE balances held in the balance sheet.

As the Council's asset base is significant, and the outputs from the valuer are subject to estimation, there is a higher inherent risk PPE may be under/overstated or the associated accounting entries incorrectly posted.

ISAs (UK and Ireland) 500 and 540 require us to undertake procedures on the use of experts and assumptions underlying fair value estimates.

What judgements are we focused on?

We focused on aspects of the land and buildings valuation which could have a material impact on the financial statements, primarily:

- significant changes in the asset base;
- the assumptions and estimates used to calculate the valuation; and
- changes to the basis for valuing the assets.

What did we do?

Considered the work performed by the Council's valuers, including the adequacy of the scope of the work performed, their professional capabilities and the results of their work;

Sample tested key asset information used by the valuers in performing their valuation (for example floor plans to support valuations based on price per square metres);

Considered the annual cycle of valuations to ensure that assets have been valued within a 5 year rolling programme as required by the Code for PPE and annually for Investment Properties.

Reviewed assets not subject to valuation in 2017/18 to confirm that the remaining asset base is not materially misstated;

Considered any changes to useful economic lives as a result of the most recent valuation; and

Tested accounting entries have been correctly processed in the financial statements

What are our conclusions?

Our work on the valuation of land and buildings is complete.

Our testing has not identified any material misstatements from inappropriate judgements being applied to the property valuation estimates.

The expert valuers possess the relevant qualifications and experience, and undertook a review of all of the Authority's assets.

We considered the underlying assumptions made by the expert valuer and concluded that they were reasonable.



Other Areas of Audit Focus

Pension liability valuation

What is the risk?

The Local Authority Accounting Code of Practice and IAS19 require the Council to make extensive disclosures within its financial statements regarding the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) in which it is an admitted body. The Council's current pension fund deficit is a highly material and sensitive item and the Code requires that this liability be disclosed on the Council's balance sheet.

The information disclosed is based on the IAS 19 report issued to the Council by the actuary As with other councils, accounting for this scheme involves significant estimation and judgement and due to the nature, volume and size of the transactions we consider this to be a higher inherent risk.

What judgements are we focused on?

We focused on aspects of the pension liability which could have a material impact on the financial statements, primarily:

- > The reasonableness of the underlying assumptions used by the Authority's expert.
- > Ensuring the information supplied to the actuary in relation to East Hertfordshire District Council was complete and accurate
- > Considering the reasonableness of any significant changes in assumptions made by the actuary:
- > Considering the assessments of the actuary undertaken by PWC and the EY actuarial team.

What did we do?

- Liaised with the auditors of the Hertfordshire Pension Fund. to obtain assurances over the information supplied to the actuary in relation to East Hertfordshire District Council;
- Assessed the work of the Pension Fund actuary Hymans Robertson including the assumptions they have used by relying on the work of PWC - Consulting Actuaries commissioned by NAO for all Local Government sector auditors, and considering any relevant reviews by the EY actuarial
- Reviewed and tested the accounting entries and disclosures made within the Council's financial statements in relation to IAS19.

What are our conclusions?

We have received reports from the Hertfordshire Pension Auditor and the EY actuarial team.

The report has identified material movements in the Authority's pension assets and related disclosures as a result of significant movements in the asset values between the date of the estimates used by the actuary to produce the IAS19 report and the year end.

The Council have obtained the revised IAS 19 report and have agreed to make the relevant changes to the accounts.

The accounting entries and disclosures are in line with our expectations and the Code.





Other matters

The applicable accounting framework is CIPFA's annual Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom (which is IFRS based as adapted for Local Authorities). The 2018/19 Code will apply to accounting periods starting on or after 1 April 2018 but has not yet been published. The 2018/19 Code will determine how IFRS 15 and IFRS9 will be adopted by local government bodies.

IFRS 15 Revenue from Customers with Contracts:

Given the nature of the Council's income streams, it is unlikely that the future implementation of IFRS 15 will have a material impact on the financial statements of the Council. The vast majority of the Council's income streams are taxation or grant based, and are therefore outside the scope of IFRS15.

The following income streams which are within the scope of IFRS 15 may be considered material by the Council in making its assessment of the impact on IFRS 15 in its 2018/19 accounts:

- fees and charges for services under statutory requirements, .g. application fees for taxi licenses or planning fees;
- sale of goods provided by the authority e.g. retail sales at leisure centres, concessionary sale at local authority theatres; and
- charges for services provided by a local authority e.g. maintenance for council dwellings or transport fares

IFRS 9 Financial Instruments:

The Council's view is that the impact of this standard on the Authority's financial statements will be immaterial. The Council will need to keep this standard under continued focus during 2018/19 because statutory overrides may be introduced by Central Government.

Our opinion on the financial statements

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF EAST HERTFORDSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of East Hertfordshire District Council for the year ended 31 March 2018 under the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014. The financial statements comprise the:

- Authority Movement in Reserves Statement,
- Authority Comprehensive Income and Expenditure Statement,
- Authority Balance Sheet,
- Authority Cash Flow Statement,
- The related notes 1 to 38; and
- The Collection Fund and the related notes 1 to 4

The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2017/18.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the financial position of East Hertfordshire District Council at 31 March 2018 and of its expenditure and income for the year then ended; and
- have been prepared properly in accordance with the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2017/18.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report below. We are independent of the authority in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard and the Comptroller and Auditor General's (C&AG) AGN01, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the ISAs (UK) require us to report to you where:

- the Chief Financial Officer's use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is not appropriate; or
- the Chief Financial Officer has not disclosed in the financial statements any identified material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt about the Authority's ability to continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting for a period of at least twelve months from the date when the financial statements are authorised for issue.



Our opinion on the financial statements

Other information

The other information comprises the information included in the statement of accounts, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The Chief Financial Officer is responsible for the other information.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in this report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether there is a material misstatement in the financial statements or a material misstatement of the other information. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of the other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Opinion on other matters prescribed by the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014

In our opinion, based on the work undertaken in the course of the audit, having regard to the guidance issued by the C&AG in November 2017, we are satisfied that, in all significant respects, East Hertfordshire District Council put in place proper arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources for the year ended 31 March 2018.

Matters on which we report by exception

We report to you if:

- in our opinion the annual governance statement is misleading or inconsistent with other information forthcoming from the audit or our knowledge of the Council;
- we issue a report in the public interest under section 24 of the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014;
- we make written recommendations to the audited body under Section 24 of the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014;
- we make an application to the court for a declaration that an item of account is contrary to law under Section 28 of the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014;
- we issue an advisory notice under Section 29 of the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014; or
- we make an application for judicial review under Section 31 of the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014.

We have nothing to report in these respects



Our opinion on the financial statements

Responsibility of the Chief Financial Officer

As explained more fully in the Statement of the Chief Financial Officer's Responsibilities set out on page 115, the Chief Financial Officer is responsible for the preparation of the Statement of Accounts, which includes the financial statements, in accordance with proper practices as set out in the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2017/18, and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

In preparing the financial statements, the Chief Financial Officer is responsible for assessing the Authority's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Authority either intends to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Authority is responsible for putting in place proper arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources, to ensure proper stewardship and governance, and to review regularly the adequacy and effectiveness of these arrangements.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Scope of the review of arrangements for securing economy, efficiency and effectiveness in the use of resources

We have undertaken our review in accordance with the Code of Audit Practice, having regard to the guidance on the specified criterion issued by the Comptroller and Auditor General (C&AG) in November 2017, as to whether the East Hertfordshire District Council had proper arrangements to ensure it took properly informed decisions and deployed resources to achieve planned and sustainable outcomes for taxpayers and local people. The Comptroller and Auditor General determined this criterion as that necessary for us to consider under the Code of Audit Practice in satisfying ourselves whether the East Hertfordshire District Council put in place proper arrangements for securing economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources for the year ended 31 March 2018.

We planned our work in accordance with the Code of Audit Practice. Based on our risk assessment, we undertook such work as we considered necessary to form a view on whether, in all significant respects, the East Hertfordshire District Council had put in place proper arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources.

We are required under Section 20(1)(c) of the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014 to satisfy ourselves that the Authority has made proper arrangements for securing economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources. The Code of Audit Practice issued by the National Audit Office (NAO) requires us to report to you our conclusion relating to proper arrangements.

We report if significant matters have come to our attention which prevent us from concluding that the Authority has put in place proper arrangements for securing economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources. We are not required to consider, nor have we considered, whether all aspects of the Authority's arrangements for securing economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources are operating effectively.

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Our opinion on the financial statements

We certify that we have completed the audit of the accounts of East Hertfordshire District Council in accordance with the requirements of the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014 and the Code of Audit Practice issued by the National Audit Office.

Audit Differences

In the normal course of any audit, we identify misstatements between amounts we believe should be recorded in the financial statements and the disclosures and amounts actually recorded. These differences are classified as "known" or "judgemental". Known differences represent items that can be accurately quantified and relate to a definite set of facts or circumstances. Judgemental differences generally involve estimation and relate to facts or circumstances that are uncertain or open to interpretation.

Summary of audit differences

Adjusted Differences

We highlight the following difference greater than our materiality level of £1.529 million which has been corrected by management that were identified during the course of our audit:

IAS 19 Pensions adjustment: As part of out audit procedures on material accounting estimated we noted that there was a material movement in the value of the overall Hertfordshire Pension Fund assets between the year end value estimated by the actuary for the purpose of producing their IAS19 reports and the actual fund assets at year end. As a result, the Council requested an updated IAS19 report from the actuary. This resulted in a decrease in the fund liability of £1.734 million (moving the liability from £31.129 million to £29,935 million). The Council has amended the statement of accounts to reflect the figures in this updated report. We will review the changes when we receive the final amended set of accounts.

Unadjusted Differences

We do not have any unadjusted misstatements greater than £0.078m which have not been corrected by management that were identified during the course of our audit


Other issues

We have noted several disclosure errors or omissions which will need to be addressed. These have been provided to management who will determine whether amendments will be made in the final version of the accounts.



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Value for Money



Background

We are required to consider whether the Council has put in place 'proper arrangements' to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness on its use of resources. This is known as our value for money conclusion.

For 2017/18 this is based on the overall evaluation criterion:

"In all significant respects, the audited body had proper arrangements to ensure it took properly informed decisions and deployed resources to achieve planned and sustainable outcomes for taxpayers and local people"

Proper arrangements are defined by statutory guidance issued by the National Audit Office. They comprise your arrangements to:

- Take informed decisions;
- Deploy resources in a sustainable manner; and
- Work with partners and other third parties.

In considering your proper arrangements, we will draw on the requirements of the CIPFA/SOLACE framework for local government to ensure that our assessment is made against a framework that you are already required to have in place and to report on through documents such as your annual governance statement.

Overall conclusion

We identified one significant risk around these arrangements, in relation to the development of Old River Lane, establishment of a housing company and the review of the leisure strategy.

The tables below present our findings in response to the risk included in our Audit Planning Report and any other issues we want to bring to your attention.

We have completed the work outlined in our audit plan and expect having no matters to report about your arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in your use of resources.



Value for Money

Value for Money Risks

We are only required to determine whether there are any risks that we consider significant within the Code of Audit Practice, where risk is defined as:

"A matter is significant if, in the auditor's professional view, it is reasonable to conclude that the matter would be of interest to the audited body or the wider public"

Our risk assessment supports the planning of enough work to deliver a safe conclusion on your arrangements to secure value for money, and enables us to determine the nature and extent of any further work needed. If we do not identify a significant risk we do not need to carry out further work.

The table below presents the findings of our work in response to the risks areas in our Audit Planning Report.

The Old River Land Development Board commissioned and received appropriate professional advice and support in relation to the development of proposals for the site, as well as cost estimates and a viability analysis. We are therefore satisfied that the information provide to Members and Officers in respect of the project is appropriate and is based on third party assessments and advice from appropriately knowledgeable professionals with relevant experience. We have seen evidence to indicate that this advice has been utilised in the discussions and decisions around the project.



Other reporting issues

Consistency of other information published with the financial statements, including the Annual Governance Statement

We must give an opinion on the consistency of the financial and non-financial information in the Statement of Accounts 2017/18 with the audited financial statements

We must also review the Annual Governance Statement for completeness of disclosures, consistency with other information from our work, and whether it complies with relevant guidance.

Financial information in the Statement of Accounts 2017/18 and published with the financial statements was consistent with the audited financial statements.

We have reviewed the Annual Governance Statement and can confirm it is consistent with other information from our audit of the financial statements and we have no other matters to report.

Alongside our work on the financial statements, we also review and report to the National Audit Office on your Whole of Government Accounts return. The extent of our review, and the nature of our report, is specified by the National Audit Office.
